- The manuscript is complete and uploaded correctly as Word file. The HTML version and/or the PDF file generated from the submitted files must be complete and approved.
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- The language in which the manuscript was written is correct and has been checked by a native speaker or a professional language service, if applicable.
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- In an experimental section identify accurately the materials and equipment used (identify the manufacturer in terms of name of company, town and country) as well as the respective experimental procedure adopted
- Avoid organizing the results and discussion section in terms of the various experimental tests performed (e.g. tensile testing, moisture content); instead, take into consideration the objectives of the work (e.g. morphology, rheological behaviour)
- Write the conclusions as a continuous text and not as a series of bullets; avoid detailed descriptions, focus on the main conclusions
- Carefully check the manuscript for:
 1. clear organization,
 2. inexistence of repeated concepts throughout the text,
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 4. in depth discussion of the results,
 5. citation format;
- Most readers of the IPP Journal are well acquainted with polymer processing, properties and characterization, hence avoid introducing well known concepts or too obvious explanations
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
